


### THE BEARS OF KATMAI Wednesday January 18, 2023 7 pm, Zoom-Only




Katmai National Park is a spectacular four million acre national park and preserve located on the Alaska Peninsula in southwest Alaska. Katmai is famous for its geology, salmon, and the world's largest protected population of brown bears, estimated at 2,200 individuals. Most visitors come to Katmai National Park to see and photograph the large numbers of brown bears that congregate at Brooks Falls to feed on the abundant spawning salmon. Katmai became a national monument in 1918 following the eruption of the Novarupta Volcano in 1912. Katmai National Park has 15 active volcanoes and its eruption was the world's largest in the 20th Century.

David Govatski will share every thing you need to know about traveling to Alaska to see the bears, including bear behavior, safety and general travel tips.

David retired from the US Forest Service after a 33-year career and currently works as a naturalist. He works as an expedition ship naturalist in Alaska in the summer and has visited and studied brown bears at Katmai, Lake Clark, Glacier Bay and Denali National Parks and elsewhere.

## Trip Reviews - January 2023

# Moxham Mountain hike Sat, Oct 8, 2022, Andrew Meunier

- We had a tiny group due to some cancellations (maybe I'll choose a later start time in the future!). But the cool weather was perfect and the foliage was near its peak with vivid oranges and reds painting the surrounding hills and mountains. We spent plenty of time enjoying the several excellent viewpoints and enjoying Cathy's spice bread. We had the mountain mostly to ourselves on the way up, but passed a parade of hikers — and their friendly dogs — on the way down. With Cathy Fleming, Rashna Meunier, and Andrew Meunier.

# Yard and Big Slide from South Meadow Sat, Oct 15, 2022, Jeff Mans

- Yard and Big Slide is always a good idea, and so it was on this outing! Starting from South Meadow along the Klondike Trail, we first had to make a short diversion around the missing footbridge over South Meadow Brook, but of course had to go look first to see if we could find a crossing. The trail offers several streams and tumbling brooks, as well as the Klondike Dam Camp Lean-to and herd path to Phelps from behind the lean-to. As we continued our descent towards the Johns Brook Valley we reached the intersecting trail towards Yard and Big Slide. We were soon following along brilliant cliffs rising from Yard's shoulders with walls of fitted stone blocks that rivaled Machu Picchu, and proof of a more advanced civilization with a rock face extension that resembled Indian Head, but on a more personal level. As we gained elevation, the valley and ranges opened behind us as we climbed past the cliffs, through the portal, and up onto the summit approach. Yard's true summit is not readily apparent, but one of the various herd paths lead to the high ground, where we stood briefly just to occupy the same space, breathe, and then search out the true meaning of Yard, which is usually found at the end of a nearby herd path where a relatively small boulder affords anyone the opportunity to climb up and take in a fine view of the valley and Great Range directly across. Next we carried on to Big Slide and arrived to find a welcoming committee of sorts to add to our wilderness experience. The views from Big Slide are legendary, for good reason, because the summit just drops to provide a wide open view of the valley and mountains. It was past peak colors, but not without some seasonal colors and crisp autumn weather that makes this one of the best times to hike. And so, while we completed our third anniversary of the broken ankle hike to Yard, we were left with the fond memories of our friends and companions who started out on this hike three years ago, but were unable to complete it with us, but oh the fun we had! ## Trip Reviews - January 2023

#### Boreas Ponds Camp/Hike/Bushwhack Cheney Cobble/ N. River Mtns. Fri, Nov 4, 2022, Jeff Mans and Jim Zwynenburg

- With the reopening of Gulf Brook Road, our task was made easy on Friday afternoon getting to Boreas Ponds and the lean -to and campsite on the Plains of Abraham above the first pond. A delightful campsite and lean-to if there ever was, complete with a nearby launch and somewhat stashed DEC canoe that we had brought paddles for, and christened as the "Tater Tot" in homage and no-thanks to the utter destruction of the existing woodland roads by trench warfare that we encountered from the 4 corners and the entire way to the start of our bushwhack to Cheney Cobble the next day. Well rested, we made breakfast and ventured through the woods to find the scarred roadway that led us up and down a hundred or so trenches to the promised land, where we entered the woods and followed a stream up towards the col between Cheney Cobble and the North River Mountains, past water slides, channels and incredibly massive cedar trees with trunks bigger than anything we've ever seen in our lives and easily over 200 years old.
