Timber Rattlesnakes: How They Live and What They Do

Guest speaker: William S. Brown, PhD | Wednesday, November 19, 2025, 7pm | Community Room, Crandall Public Library



Bill will summarize the basic biology of Timber Rattlesnakes and focus on some of the research questions that are useful for evaluating its conservation status. He will frame this perspective toward outdoor enthusiasts and naturalists who may encounter a rattlesnake in the wild. In New York, Timber Rattlesnakes are distributed in two dozen counties. Many populations were extirpated or depleted throughout the state over the past two centuries. The species was listed as "threatened" in 1983 and has been fully protected by New York State law for the past 40 years. Three Great Cruises: Antarctica, the Baltic and the Pacific Northwest

Presentation by John Schneider | Wednesday, January 21, 2025 | Crandall Public Library

In 2023, I went on three cruises. Each one was totally different from the others. My first one was my third trip to my favorite place in the natural world – Antarctica's South Georgia Island. The island has some of the world's largest king penguin colonies. Three landings stand out: estimates of 23,000, 75,000 and 125,000 penguins in one location. We went ashore at least twice each day and viewed penguins, fur seals and elephant seals, as well as many seabirds. This trip was not complete until we drank a toast at the grave of Antarctic explorer Sir Ernest Shackleton.

My second cruise was on the Baltic Sea where we visited areas of Denmark, Poland, Latvia, Estonia, Finland and Sweden. We explored parts of Europe I had not visited before. Unfortunately, illness required us to cut this trip short, but fortunately, this occurred toward the end of the cruise.

We ended our cruise year with a river cruise down the Snake and Columbia rivers in Idaho, Washington and Oregon. Many super floods, some of the largest in the world, occurred in this part of our country creating what are called channeled scablands. Also, one of the country's most beautiful waterfall is on the Columbia River.

Come and enjoy pictures of thousands of toasting the "Boss," penguins, fur seal pups and really heavy elephant seals of South Georgia and the Falkland islands; interesting aspects of the Baltic; and the beautiful scenery of our Pacific Northwest.

Update from ADK's New Executive Director, Cortney Worrall

Dear Chapters and Chapter Leadership,

I am writing to say hello to each chapter and to thank you. Thank you for being a part of what makes ADK great, for your support, your involvement, and for the many volunteer hours you have put into your chapters and ADK. Thank you also for your patience in hearing from me as ADK's new Executive Director. I am entering my sixth month at ADK and it's been gratifying and challenging. I am writing to update you on a few things and look forward to keeping in touch more often.

Many of you have reached out to ADK staff and me about questions centered on the Cascade Welcome Center and its future. After months of discussion, ADK has made the difficult decision to sell the Center and work to concentrate our staff time, energy, and focus on our operations at Heart Lake, Johns Brook Lodge, and our many programs. We will concentrate fully on our own work and influence including outdoor leadership training, education, hospitality, trails, and stewardship for the Adirondacks and New York's wild lands.

As much as we wanted Cascade to succeed under ADK, the reality was that it stretched us too far. As you can imagine, deciding to step back was incredibly hard. It's not just the public who are disappointed, but our staff who had poured hard work, sweat, and passion into the facility for a very long time. We are proud we are leaving the property and facility vastly improved. We believe this is the right choice—one that allows us to refocus and move forward in a stronger, more intentional way.

I also want to acknowledge the input we have received regarding our email highlighting the tremendous need to reach out to federal representatives. It's baked into ADK's programs and focus that the Adirondacks and Catskills, and NYS State public lands should be, and are, the primary focus of our advocacy. And yet, I would love to give you some background here about our advocacy to put our recent messages in context.

ADK co-leads the major effort to ensure there is \$10 million earmarked each year in the NYS Budget's Environmental Protection Fund (EPF) to fund stewardship and preservation in high-use areas in the Adirondacks and Catskills. This funds our work and the work of our partners. As we face the rolling back of funding and protections for public lands and environmental programs across the nation due to federal cuts, we and our partners are very concerned about the potential impacts to New York. Federal actions can have a direct impact on state budgets and conservation priorities. Any pressure and impact from you to our federal representatives will have a positive ripple effect, which is why taking a few short minutes to reach out to your representatives through our action page will go a long way.

Click on Take Action Now! | Adirondack Mountain Club, to see where you can send letters to federal representatives and encourage state legislators who need to be thanked for their leadership and urged to continue making environmental funding a priority.

Lastly, I look forward to meeting more chapters and I extend many thanks to those who have reached out. I have very much enjoyed the time at meetings and events, so please keep reaching out.

Please look forward to skiing opportunities at Heart Lake this winter which we are working on. We are eager to bring us back to the organization's early skiing roots found at Heart Lake.

We will be sending more regular updates to chapter leadership, so stay tuned for more information from me and our staff in the coming weeks and months. Thank you for all that you do and please let me know if you have any questions.
